What to expect when you visit the Alutiiq Museum:



 Overview of the different eras of Alutiiq History

Scavenger Hunt



Schedule one - two weeks in advance

# Museum Programs

Community Archaeology: Volunteers are invited to work in an archaeological field crew.

Traveling Traditions: A program that combines exhibits on Alutiiq arts with week-long workshops designed to teach students traditional artistic techniques.

Language Program: A program dedicated to documenting and revitalizing the Alutiiq language of the Kodiak Archipelago.

Petroglyph Survey: Documenting an extensive collection of Alutiiq petroglyphs dating 500 - 1500 years ago.

Educational Programs: public lectures, school tours, education boxes, & public access to educational materials.
